Hurricane Sandy Relief Information

Name of Organization: UJA-Federation of New York

1. What is the approximate dollar amount of donations and pledges that your organization has received to date in response to Hurricane Sandy?

\$4,294,190 through December 11, 2012.

2. Will these funds be used solely for Hurricane Sandy relief? If not, approximately what portion will be used for Hurricane Sandy relief and what other purposes will funds be used for?

Yes, funds have been and will be used entirely for Hurricane Sandy relief, with no funds used for overhead or other expenses.

3. Approximately how much has your organization spent to date on Hurricane Sandy relief?

UJA-Federation of New York has spent \$3,709,945 in grants through December 11, 2012. In addition, UJA-Federation of New York has approved and will soon be granting \$1,000,000 to Jewish day schools to enable them to provide tuition assistance for day school students from impacted families, and \$500,000 to agencies to enable them to provide tuition assistance for children from impacted families enrolled in their early childhood education programs.

4. What services has y organization provided to those affected by Hurricane Sandy? What populations or geographical areas are being served by your organization in response to Hurricane Sandy? What services does it expect to provide in the future?

- **UJA-Federation of New York funding has been provided to organizations addressing immediate needs in Zone A and the South Shore of Long Island, where damages were most severe. Funding has been granted to organizations that provide emergency food, temporary housing, financial counseling, legal services related to FEMA applications, case management, volunteer coordination and other crisis-oriented services for people**

impacted by the storm. The Zone A communities include Staten Island, Southern Brooklyn, Lower Manhattan and the Rockaways and Belle Harbor

- UJA-Federation of New York has allocated grants to organizations that provide cash assistance to residents of impacted areas for needs such as clothing, transportation, appliances, auto repairs, furniture, bedding, and laundry. For example, UJA-Federation of New York provided a grant to the Barry and Florence Friedberg JCC to provide funds for furniture replacement for 98 individuals who suffered furniture damage due to the storm.
- UJA-Federation of New York anticipates the provision of funding to organizations to provide mental-health for trauma needs resulting from the storm.
- UJA-Federation of New York has approved grants to Jewish day schools to enable them to provide tuition assistance for students from families who live in Zone A and on the South Shore of Long Island, and whose financial ability to meet tuition commitments has been severely impacted due to the storm.
- UJA-Federation of New York has provided grants to synagogues and Jewish day schools with severely damaged property due to the storm for temporary costs associated with relocation. For example, UJA-Federation of New York granted Temple Beth El in Rockaway Park \$22,000 for costs for a temporary trailer to enable them to hold services.
- UJA-Federation of New York has made grants to IsraAID and Nechama to coordinate volunteers and resources to clean and sanitize homes and synagogues in affected areas.
- UJA-Federation of New York has approved funding for disaster relief coordination through the Mayor's Fund to Advance New York City.

5. Has your organization provided funding to other organizations for Hurricane Sandy relief efforts? If so, which organizations have received those funds and what is the approximate dollar amount provided to them? How does your organization determine the need for funding?

Yes. As described above, UJA-Federation of New York is providing funding to organizations that provide direct services for Hurricane Sandy relief. For example, UJA-Federation of New York granted \$95,800 to the Jewish Association Serving the Aging (JASA) to provide hot meals to tenants without power in the aftermath of the storm. To determine the need for funding, UJA-Federation of New York established a committee called Connect to Recovery comprised of UJA-Federation of New York donors and professionals. UJA-Federation of New York has also reached out to other funders to collaborate in efforts to assist communities where appropriate. UJA-Federation of New York determines the need for funding based on requests made by agencies in affected areas, and in response to outreach efforts to determine needs in response to those affected by the storm.

6. Has your organization provided, or does it intend to provide, direct financial assistance to individuals, families or businesses for Hurricane Sandy relief? If so, what is the approximate dollar amount that your organization has provided to date and approximately how much direct financial assistance does it expect to provide in the future? How does your organization determine the need for assistance?

No, UJA-Federation of New York does not provide direct grants to individuals. Instead, UJA-Federation of New York makes grants to organizations that provide direct cash or tuition assistance to individuals and families. The grants that UJA-Federation of New York has made to human service agencies for cash assistance for individuals and families uses an eligibility form that requires documentation proving need, including prior application to FEMA. Grants to Jewish day schools to provide tuition assistance for students require a similar application process with specific guidelines for eligibility. At the beginning of the crisis, UJA-Federation of New York provided grants of \$5,000 each to synagogues in Zone A or the South Shore of Long Island to directly assist their congregants who have been impacted. UJA-Federation of New York also provided grants to Jewish day schools to directly assist the educators at their schools who have been impacted financially by the storm.

7. Does your organization have a plan in place on how to use any surplus funds not spent for Hurricane Sandy relief? If so, please describe that plan.

No, UJA-Federation of New York intends to spend all funds raised. UJA-Federation of New York's board of directors has also authorized up to \$10 million to supplement funds raised from the community of donors.
