<p><b>Please describe the types of assistance that your organization has provided to those affected by Hurricane Sandy.</b></p>	<p><b>Description of Efforts</b>  <b>Food, Coat and Holiday Gift Distribution</b>                      New York Cares was a constant and reassuring presence in the hardest hit neighborhoods, where we served hundreds of meals a day in the months following Hurricane Sandy. In 2012, we provided 5,000 Thanksgiving Day feasts to families at locations like the Queens LibraryÆs Far Rockaway Branch, and we hosted an array of holiday celebrations throughout the month of December in 2012 and 2013. With so many people homeless, without power, and having lost all of their possessions, we moved up the start date of our annual Coat Drive, launching it in early November 2012. The NYPD ð our longtime partner ð agreed to begin early collections at every one of their precincts. We also secured ð for the first time ð the participation of all three library systems, and as a result, every library branch (including Queens LibraryÆs Far Rockaway Branch, pictured to the right) throughout the city served as a public collection site. At our 1,826 collection sites, we collected more than 123,000 coats ð a marked expansion over the 76,000 coats we collected in 2011 ð which we sorted and distributed as quickly as possible thanks to the assistance of more than 1,400 volunteers. Among the more than 123,000 coats, 36,675 were given to New Yorkers hardest hit by Sandy. Additionally, we answered 15,940 Winter Wishes (holiday gift requests) letters from 10 schools and agencies in the impacted communities. For many of the children, teens, and seniors who received a gift through our Winter Wishes program, our gift was the only gift that they received.</p> <p><b>Muck Out and Mold Remediation</b>                      As a key player in the muck out efforts, we sent New York Cares volunteers to the Rockaways and southern Brooklyn to clear 405 homes of drywall, sand, sheet rock, floorboards, and all water-damaged items until September 2013. Homes with water damage must be thoroughly mucked out before other service providers can come in, which makes this an essential task in the restoration process. In addition, we hired independent contractors to provide mold remediation services for 30 homeowners who could not afford the service on their own.</p> <p><b>Rebuilding</b>                      As the need for our muck out and mold remediation services ended, our response to Hurricane Sandy has shifted to rebuilding projects. New York Cares has partnered with Yellow Boots on Staten Island and Friends of Rockaway in Queens to rebuild homes devastated by the storm. In order to return these homes to working and livable conditions, New York Cares volunteers are installing insulation, hanging drywall, installing subfloors and flooring, and much more. New York Cares has also helped two community organizations ð the All American Soccer Club and Bethel AME Food Pantry ð that were damaged by the storm to reopen and resume meeting the pressing needs of their clients.</p> <p><b>Ongoing Social Services</b>                      Helping hurricane-ravaged neighborhoods thrive again is about much more than the initial cleanup efforts. With your support, we have tutored students who missed weeks of schools because of flooded classrooms (for example, we started a Readers Club that met each Saturday at the Queens LibraryÆs Far Rockaway Branch); visited seniors who were even more isolated in SandyÆs aftermath; and helped dislocated families get back on track. We are continuing to build our ongoing services for the impacted neighborhoods, keeping in mind that the goal is not just to get struggling communities back to their pre-Sandy state ð when services were already scarce ð but to further build and improve services for disadvantaged residents.</p>
