
Dear Mr. Lilien:

	<p>Following Hurricane Sandy, the Mayor's Fund, through its emergency relief efforts, provided: hot meals (more than 330,000); relief supplies and storage/distribution (including approximately: 350,000 cleaning supply items, 300,000 personal toiletries, 110,000 body warmers, 30,000 batteries, and co-payments of medications for homebound New Yorkers); transportation for evacuees (to Distribution Centers, shower facilities and shelters) and volunteers (to dispatch service locations); groceries (including fresh produce and nonperishables); debris removal crews; and daily living needs (including portable restrooms and shower facilities). These were provided in coordination with the City's Distribution and Restoration Centers, New York City agencies, City Community Recovery Directors, along with community partners and local elected officials.</p> <p>The Mayor's Fund is supporting a series of ongoing recovery and rebuilding initiatives in the wake of Hurricane Sandy, including: home rebuilding services to undertake minor-to-moderate, non-structural home repairs; mold treatment for residents and mold awareness workshops in conjunction with distribution of cleaning kits in affected neighborhoods; expanded capacity for the emergency food network, such as soup kitchens and food pantries, through mini-grants that support food delivery and other needs; counseling and legal services to give residents expert help navigating the recovery process; grants, interest-free bridge loans, and professional legal services for affected nonprofits; grants to affected small businesses and support for business district revitalization; repairs to childcare centers and materials for interim facilities; expanded support for public school students (including mentoring/counseling programs and</p>

	<p>tutoring for students who lost school time); repair and cleanup services at parks, beaches and nonprofits; help replacing lost materials and repairing critical equipment within impacted public libraries; citywide and borough-specific Sandy coordinators for nonprofit service organizations; outreach workers to support immigrant and non-English speaking community members; services that will support individuals and families with psychological effects they may be experiencing post hurricane; purchasing supplies and other needs for volunteer recovery projects.</p> <p>Initiatives supported by the Mayor’s Fund serve all populations and communities within the affected regions of New York City (with the exception of three donor-specified grants that were directed to the Hurricane Sandy New Jersey Relief Fund and the United Way of Connecticut and United Way of Long Island).</p>

	<p>The Mayor’s Fund has partnered with many organizations engaged in Hurricane Sandy relief and recovery efforts. Commitments include: \$10 million to Habitat for Humanity International for a nonprofit repair consortium that will undertake home rebuilding projects; \$10 million to the Fund for the City of New York to provide nonprofit recovery loans and grants; \$5,596,554 to Neighborhood Revitalization NYC (NRNYC) to coordinate and help provide mold treatment in homes; \$5 million to the New York Business Development Corporation (NYBDC) for a small business matching grant program; \$2.065 million to the Fund for Public Schools for expanded mentoring/counseling programs and tutoring for students who lost school time; \$1,543,250 to Food Bank for New York City and \$265,000 to City Harvest to support food pantries and soup kitchens to purchase food, conduct benefits outreach, and expand or restore program operations); \$1.25 million to the New York City Business Assistance Corporation (NYBAC) to provide micro-grants to small businesses; \$1.2 million to Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) to assist small building owners in arranging financing and carrying out housing rehabilitation services; \$1 million to the Center for New York City Neighborhoods (CNYCN) to sponsor a network of housing counselors and legal service providers for residents; \$917,500 to the NYC Department of Probation to hire and train youth to help with recovery projects; \$287,850 to Center for Employment Opportunities, \$180,000 to Goodwill, \$157,150 to Strive, and \$125,000 to Nontraditional Employment for Women to provide construction training to residents in affected areas to work on hurricane rebuilding projects; \$250,000 to the Brooklyn Public Library, \$250,000 to the Queens Public Library and \$50,000 to the New York Public Library to help replace circulation materials and electronic equipment in impacted libraries; \$100,000 each to Catholic Charities, Met Council on Jewish Poverty, Good Shepherd, and the Human Services Council for community coordinators to assist with coordination of non-profit resources and ongoing needs of communities most impacted by Sandy; \$384,000 to the Federation of Protestant Welfare Agencies to support outreach workers in immigrant communities; \$350,000 to NY Legal Assistance Group (NYLAG) to conduct outreach and civil legal services to immigrant victims of Hurricane</p>


	<p>Sandy; \$98,468 to University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey in partnership with CUNY Public Health at Hunter to deliver mold awareness and safe practices trainings; \$70,000 to the Fund for Public Health to assist individuals and families with psychological effects post-hurricane; and \$46,000 to the Lawyers Alliance of New York to provide professional legal services to affected New York City nonprofits.</p> <p>Grants awarded have been based on factors including urgency of need, impact of disbursement, input from City officials, field staff and community organizations in impacted areas, lack of alternative funding sources, and donor specification when applicable. Proposals are either submitted to or solicited by the Mayor's Fund. The proposals are then reviewed for consideration of grant award and are approved by the Board Chair, Secretary and the President of the Mayor's Fund.</p> <p>Donor-advised grants include: \$4.9 million to the City Parks Foundation for Conservation Corps and the Natural Areas Conservancy for storm damaged natural areas; \$350,000 to St. Mary's Healthcare System for Children to purchase medical relief supplies and equipment for disabled children affected by the hurricane; \$221,321.06 to the New Jersey Relief Fund to support relief efforts in New Jersey; \$221,321.06 to the United Way of Long Island to support relief efforts in Long Island; \$150,000 to the Battery Conservancy to support restoration efforts in the Battery, including park grounds and facilities; \$150,000 to the Central Park Conservancy to support restoration efforts in Central Park including care for trees, debris removal and park repairs; \$147,547.37 to the United Way of Connecticut to support relief efforts in Connecticut; \$75,000 to New York Says Thank You to support rebuilding efforts; \$15,000 to the FDNY Foundation to assist firefighters whose homes were severely affected by Hurricane Sandy in the Rockaways and Staten Island; \$10,000 to Jewish Family &amp; Children's Services to fund supplies for dislocated individuals and families.</p> <p>All grants are solely made to registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit charities. The Mayor's Fund monitors the use of grant funds by requiring all grant recipients to submit regular narrative, data and financial reports.</p>

	<p>No, however the Mayor's Fund has provided direct services such as dissemination of essential supplies to residents through the City's Distribution Centers. And as described in #5, the Mayor's Fund has scaled its impact by funding organizations that are providing assistance to affected residents, nonprofits and businesses.</p>
7.	<p>What is your organization's plan for using any surplus funds not spent for Hurricane Sandy relief?</p>
	<p>All funds will be spent on Hurricane relief and recovery.</p>

	Contributions to the Mayor's Fund includes gifts from associations, nonprofit organizations, foundations, donor-advised funds, and in some cases from fundraising benefits that such organizations have held to support Mayor's Fund hurricane relief efforts.
9.	Is your organization still conducting fundraising for relief efforts? If so, please describe the methods by which you are raising funds.
	The Mayor's Fund is no longer actively soliciting donations for Hurricane Sandy relief but continues to receive and accept contributions for relief efforts online, by mail, and by text message. A variety of ad hoc fundraising efforts (ongoing and completed) have designated the Mayor's Fund as a beneficiary.
